Dear Birders -

I suspected I had a problem when my first thought after "Gloria" hit was "can't wait to see what birds the storm blew in". I knew I had a problem when I didn't go to see what she blew in and was home to get word of the Royal Tern in Turner's Falls. Since most of the bird alert people were out birding, it fell my lot to pass the word (to be honest I did have some very able help). I hope you who were reachable were reached.

This news letter is in response to requests for keeping in touch concerning meetings, field trips, announcements, etc. The plan is to send one out to members every second month if funds allow.

MEETINGS

On <u>Monday, October 21</u> at 7:30 at the Hitchcock Center, Seth Kellogg will give a slide presentation on hawks. <u>Monday, November 18</u> at 7:30 at the Hitchcock Center Tom Tyning, will give his slide presentation on "Birding Brigantine". <u>December 9th</u> will be members' night and <u>January 13th</u> Scott Surner will give his presentation on Monhegan Island. (More about these two in the next letter.)

FIELD TRIPS

On <u>Sunday</u>, <u>November 3</u> Tom Gagnon will lead a trip to the Berkshire Lakes to spot migrating waterfowl, shorebirds and early winter finches. Birders are to meet at Bradley's parking lot (Northampton) at 6:00 a.m. This is an all day trip. Bring lunch and dress warmly.

IMPORTANT:

From now on, in fairness to the leader, we ask that you let it be known if you plan on joining a field trip. If there is not enough interest, the trip can then be cancelled, or other arrangements made. For the Berkshire Lakes trip please leave your name and phone number on the tape (256-1836). In case of hurricanes, unexpected rare birds elsewhere, the plague or other unpredictable factors, you will be contacted, either to cancel or rearrange.

HAMPSHIRE BIRD VOICE

In addition to using the tape to alert birders to what is being seen during the week, we are using it for announcements of meetings, field trips (some are formed after the bimonthly letter goes out). If there is a good bird in the area, directions on how to find it will be given. If a group is going to see it, this information with time and place to meet for car pooling will also be on the tape. Be sure to check the <u>Voice</u> regularly so you wont miss anything.
