Whether "green" brings visions of a spring of tender blades of grass, or of salamander crossings or of Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, the truth remains that spring does bring a very full schedule for us all. Instead of concentrating on term papers or final exams or (heaven help us) spring housecleaning this year, how about the following alternatives brought to you by your Bird Board:

PROGRAMS

BIRDING ETHICS ??? !!!

At the risk of getting you all "RAIL"ed up -Imagine seventy birdwatchers, tramping through a marsh at night during breeding season, slipping, falling, moving into a circle, and surrounding and closing in on a Yellow Rail. The bird flushes and is caught by hand by Flashlights are aimed on the bird and everyone gets a one of the birders. close look before the bird is released. Couldn't happen? Think again! This event took place a year ago during the annual American Birding Association (ABA) National Convention held in Duluth. As you may well imagine, the reporting of this incident elicited a response from many ABA members and it certainly got our Bird Board's attention. In order to facilitate greater understanding of what birding ethics involves the Board has arranged for a panel to discuss the subject at the April meeting. panel (John Green, Mark Lynch, Jim Marcum and Susan Smith) and moderator (David Spector) are active bird watchers who have also lead birding and natural history trips. Susan and David are also academic ornithologists. A variety of approaches to bird watching will be represented and you will have your chance to express your own opinions. David asks that you consider the following:

"I walk across a field once. - I walk across that field daily. - I lead 20 people across a field once. - I lead 20 people across that field weekly. - I wonder why there seem to be fewer sparrows and Bobolinks nesting there this year?"

In January of this year the Board voted to adopt The ABA Code of Ethics. (There is a copy of this for your records on the back of the "new members" list included in this mailing.) As we move into the woods and fields this spring, what should we be aware of? What are our responsibilities to the welfare of the environment and of the birds that have become so important to us? Come cheer for your favorite advocate or be your own advocate or be the devil's advocate at what promises to be a very lively evening! The meeting is on Monday. April 9. 7:30. at the Hitchcock Center. Our apologies to our Jewish friends for scheduling this meeting on Passover. By the time we were aware of our oversight, it was too late to make program changes.

On <u>Monday</u>, <u>May 14</u>, Brian Cassie, birding tour leader and coordinator of the Butterfly Atlas project with Mass Audubon will present a slide show entitled "Birding Argentina."

H.B.C. RARE BIRD ALERT

A telephone tree is used to alert interested members to rare birds in the area. Fifteen sightings were successfully reported last year. Birders saw, or attempted to see, Common Black-headed Gull (Hadley, 10/3), Hudsonian Godwit (Hadley, 10/19), Green-tailed Towhee (Brattleboro, VT 12/22), Short-eared Owl (Sunderland, 1/18), Ross' Gull (Gloucester, 2/1), Short-eared Owl (Hadley, 2/1), Cassin's Finch -? (Athol, 2/3), Yellow-headed Blackbird (Northampton, 3/24), Loggerhead Shrike (Athol, 3/26), Fork-tailed Flycatcher (Concord, 5/2), Cattle Egret (Gill 5/17), Golden-winged Warbler (Gill, 5/17), Red-headed Woodpecker (Deerfield, 5/17), Curlew Sandpiper (Plum Island, 7/7), and Eared Grebe (Gloucester, 7/7).

As was true last year, the VOICE will be used to report local sightings of interesting birds. This should meet the needs of many of us. For those of us who are more interested in going after rare or unusual birds the Rare Bird Alert telephone tree will be activated. There will be two categories:

- A. For rare birds in the Pioneer Valley only.
- B. For rare birds in the Pioneer Valley and beyond.

Signing up for either category implies that you want to <u>be</u> called and are willing to <u>call</u> at any time. The secret to making the telephone tree work is individual committment to passing along the word.

It is <u>absolutely essential</u> that you call the next person on the list immediately. If unable to reach that individual <u>personally</u>, you keep going down the list until you do reach someone. <u>It is still your responsibility</u> to see that those not contacted are reached later on. Please do not sign up if you are only casually interested.

People responding no later than <u>September 15</u> will be included on the first tree. An additional tree will be formed in December if enough people are interested.

BIRD CLUBS ORGANIZE TO AID RESEARCH ON MIGRANT BIRDS

First Project: A Used Binocular Drive.

Hampshire Bird Club has joined with Manomet Bird Observatory and 17 other state bird clubs to form MBO/Mass. Birders' Forum a network of bird clubs working to establish ties with research, conservation, and education groups in Latin America.

Birders are mobilizing in a promising new effort to help protect threatened birds and their habitats throughout the Western Hemisphere. The idea for a network focusing around bird conservation strategies grew out of the sense of emergency that pervaded a symposium on the ecology and conservation of migrant birds sponsored by MBO last December. The overriding message from the conference was that certain populations of birds are declining and that deforestation in the tropics and habitat fragmentation in North America may be accelerating this ominous trend.

On the final day of the symposium a delegation of Latin American scientists delivered an eloquent plea for help: "Migrant birds do not recognize political borders. To save these species we must begin to have a similar perspective of the hemisphere," said Luis Naranjo of Columbia. Among the problems facing researchers, Dr. Naranjo noted, is the fact that binoculars, scopes, and banding supplies are often prohibitively expensive or simply unavailable in Latin America. There are many trained field biologists, eager to understand what is happening to birds and habitats in their countries, who must struggle along ill-equipped for the task.

Responding to this need, the Forum's initial project is a used binocular drive (used spotting scopes and tripods would be welcomed also). No matter how "unworthy" you feel that old pair of binoculars up in the attic might be, it is still better than nothing and may be much better than what someone is currently using.

Anyone who would like to donate used equipment may bring it to the Hitchcock Center during regular Center hours or to the Hampshire Bird Club meetings on September 10, October 15 or November 19.

In September, all HBC members will be receiving from Manomet the Forum's first newsletter which will include more detailed information about this exciting new project. If you have any questions about the Forum or how to donate call Jan Ortiz 549 - 1768.

Before getting into the heart and soul of this dispatch, I have some public service announcements to make.

Announcement #2: As you will note when you call, the <u>HBC VOICE</u> has become the <u>WESTERN MASSACHUSETTS VOICE OF AUDUBON</u>. It is still the place to learn what birds have been seen in the area, to hear about events of interest to birders, and to report your sightings. To receive information call <u>253-2218</u>. To report sightings call <u>256-1836</u>.

Announcement #3: If you joined the HBC after the RARE BIRD ALERT telephone tree was set up and would like to be included on the extended list please get in touch with Jim Marcum (549-1613) by December 15.

May I be among the first to wish you a happy December - the month that brings us Hanukkah, Christmas, Boxing Day, two full moons and --- yes, it's finally here --- the ANNUAL CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT. I truly hope you have taken my early warnings seriously and will be fully prepared when the count down reaches the GREAT DAY! Ah - standing motionless for twenty minutes at 3:00 a.m. by a railroad crossing attempting to hear an owl responding to a tape with wind gusting to 50 mph; the numbness of the trudge through open fields at dawn listening for "chips" of birds who wouldn't be caught awake at that ridiculous hour; the intellectual challenge of accurate tabulation of thousands of starlings coming in for evening roost - how we love it!

Actually this can be a very rewarding and enjoyable event. Sponsored by the National Audubon Society, the Christmas Count is a census of birdlife taken each year at the end of December. From a modest beginning in 1899 it has become a major information-gathering event with thousands participating across the continent. Fed into the computer, the data give densities of wintering bird populations and points out cyclical movements and evidence of changes in populations. When studied over the years, it is helpful in detecting trends and possible environmental problems.

You don't have to be an expert and you don't have to count all day. In fact, you can participate by simply counting birds at your feeders in the warmth of your home. (That thought kept returning to me last year by that railroad crossing!) If you are a beginner, you will be put with a more experienced birder. Our local count covers an area on both sides of the river. It will take place on Sunday, December 16 and we'll be organizing it following the December meeting. If you are interested in participating but can't attend the meeting, please call Scott Surner (253-7486) for information and assignment east of the Connecticut. If you plan to count west of the river, Chris Hill (585-5138) is the person to call. Following the count there is a potluck supper at Arcadia at 6:00 p.m. when the day's count of the whole area will be compiled. There will be similar counts at Springfield on December 15 (call Mort Bates at 783-6411), at Quabbin on December 29 (call Scott at 253-7486) and at Greenfield on December 30 (call Mark Fairbrother at 367-2695). There is a fee of \$5.00 per person which goes to American Birds to help defray the costs of compiling and publishing the count results.

The meeting on <u>Monday</u>, <u>December 10</u>, at the Hitchcock Center at 7:30 p.m. is the annual holiday party. Members are asked to bring a snack or dessert to share and up to 10 natural history slides to show. Remember that we shall be organizing the local Christmas Bird Count following the meeting.

January Events

On <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>January 1</u> be ready for the BIRD BLITZ, our annual search for local birds. It's a great way to start the year and your year list. Coming just after all the Christmas Counts, our leader, Scott Surner, <u>should</u> know where to find the birds. Meet at the Hitchcock at 7:00 a.m. Call Scott (253-7486) if you want to join the group.

On <u>Saturday</u>, <u>January 5</u> Bob Bieda will take us on an all day trip to Cape Ann and Plum Island. Be sure to call him at 527-2623 if you wish to go. As you know, interesting birds can show up any place at that time of the year and Bob may wish to change the destination.

Chris Davis returns with live birds for our first meeting of 1991, Monday, January 14, 7:30 at the Hitchcock Center. His topic is "Falconry".

Saturday, January 19 will be a walk into East Quabbin by way of Gate 40 with Morris Lainer. Please call him at 527-9912 if you are interested.

David Spector will be giving a lecture entitled "Introduction to Birdwatching" on <u>January 24</u> though the Hitchcock Center. He will also be teaching a class on Winter Bird Watching, beginning on <u>February 3</u>. Please call the Hitchcock Center at 256-6006 for more information and to register. There is a fee.

Miscellaneous



Pioneers in Bird Illustration

Catesby, Bewick, Wilson and Audubon

Number of pieces: 50-60 framed prints 12-15 engraved wood blocks intrepretive panels photos maps The 1700s and 1800s were marked by a great surge of interest in natural history. This trend is beautifully exemplified by the development of illustrated books on birds. The best of these books was produced by a small group of artist-naturalists who combined skills in ornithology and art to record the splendor of birds for others to enjoy. In the process, these pioneers — Mark Catesby, Thomas Bewick, Alexander Wilson and John James Audubon — created a new art form and changed our attitudes toward nature.

Pioneers in Bird Illustration features original prints from Catesby's Natural History of Carolina, Florida and the Bahamas 1731-1743, Bewick's History of British Birds 1797-1804, Wilson's American Ornithology 1808-1814, and Audubon's The Birds of America 1827-1838. Through these images, the exhibit frames a window on how America's wild heritage was first seen by these early explorers. Mark Catesby's 11 years of

tramping through the southern colonies culminated in the first illustrated natural history of North America. Alexander Wilson's definitive work on American birds helped tie our national identity with wilderness and wildlife. The centerpiece of the exhibit will be prints from the Bell Museum's double-elephant folio of Audubon's Birds of America, the most dramatic of the books. The exhibit also includes a set of prints and original engraved wood blocks by Thomas Bewick, whose work stimulated Britain's fascination with natural history.

This exhibition celebrates the rich resources in ornithological art that have not been previously recognized. While providing an eyewitness account of the discovery of America's wildlife and documenting the evolution of an art form, **Pioneers in Bird Illustration** demonstrates the links between scientific advancement and artistic creativity.

PIONEERS OF BIRD ILLUSTRATION EXHIBITION:

DATES: December 4, 1990 through January 27, 1991

CONTENT: The eighteenth and nineteenth centuries were marked by a great surge of interest in natural history. Beautifully illustrated books on birds were produced at the time by a small group of artist-naturalists who combined their skills in ornithology and art to record the splendor of birds for the enjoyment of all. These four English and American pioneers - Mark Catesby, Thomas Bewick, Alexander Wilson and John James Audubon - created a new art form and changed America's vision of and attitude toward nature. The exhibition features over fifty engravings, etchings and relief prints, many hand-tinted with watercolor, supplemented by a selection of printing blocks, maps and photographs. The prints on view document the evolution of an art form that joined scientific inquiry with artistic creativity to express a vivid appreciation

of the inherent value of wildlife and the wilderness.

PREVIEW: The preview party for the exhibition will be held on Saturday, December 8, from 6 pm - 8 pm. For members of the Worcester Art Museum and Massachusetts Audubon Society.

PROGRAMS: The Worcester Art Museum has organized a full program of related events and activities beginning Sunday, December 9 with OUTSIDE-IN DAY. Throughout the exhibition there will be lectures, tours,

slide talks, hikes and films. A full listing concludes the exhi-

bition press release and is summarized in the calendar of events. Organized by the James Ford Bell Museum of National History in EXHIBITION

> Minneapolis, the exhibition at the Worcester Art Museum is supported by the Britta Jeppson Curatorial Fund. In an effort to combine art and science, the Worcester Art Museum and the Massachusetts Audubon Society have joined together for this exhibi-

tion and related events.
