A special meeting on Mon., 3/11, 7:30 p.m. at the Hitchcock Ce. Wayne Petersen, Field Ornithologist for Mass. Audubon, will present a slide show entitled "Shorebirds - A Profile Incredible." Wayne is the Summer Season and Christmas Bird Count Editor for the New England Region of American Birds, has contributed over forty species accounts to the Audubon Society Master Guide to Birding, and is past president of the Nuttall Ornithological Club. His research experience spans North and Central America from Belize to James Bay, Canada. Wayne is also an international tour leader for Field Guides and teaches a week-long workshop on shorebirds for the Institute for Field Ornithology in Maine.

Birding Workshops with Wayne Petersen





Hampshire Bird Club and the Hitchock Center are pleased to announce to their members that the following workshops are being offered this fall! HBC is very excited to be able to bring to its members these lectures and field trips of the highest quality. We hope that you will agree that this is a great opportunity for us and that you will support this project with your participation.

Each workshop will include a weeknight lecture at the Hitchcock Center followed by a weekend field trip to Eastern Massachusetts. You may attend just the evening lecture. The field part of the workshop will be limited to 20 participants so an early sign-up is recommended.



For many years ducks, geese, and swans have been domesticated, hunted, studied, and admired. As a result a great deal is now known about this large and diverse family of birds.

With nearly thirty-five species of waterfowl occurring in Massachusetts annually, the opportunities for investigation and appreciation are many. In this workshop, topics to be covered include waterfowl adaptations, breeding biology, the peculiarities of waterfowl molt, nigration strategies, and helpful hints on identifying local species on a water and on the wing. Slides, specimens, and printed handouts will augment the indoor lecture session.

A one-day field trip will provide a chance for participants to witness autumn sea duck migration at Manomet Point and to visit several inland South Shore localities where a variety of pond and diving ducks will be observed. As many as 25 species of waterfowl may be seen on the field trip.

Wayne R. Petersen

Wayne R. Petersen is a field ornithologist for the Massachusetts Audubon Society. He has been involved in bird study for over thirty years, during which time he has written many papers on birds, has given workshops for BIRD OBSERVER and the Institute for Field Ornithology in Maine, has lectured widely on ornithology, and has taught ornithology courses for Manomet Bird Observatory, the Cape Cod Museum of Natural History, and Lesley College. He contributed a number of species accounts to The Audubon Society Master Guide to Birding and is currently the American Birds New England regional litor for the nesting season and the Christmas Bird Count. Wayne is international tour leader for the Massachusetts Audubon Society and Field Guides. Inc. The HBC was pleased to have Wayne give a presentation on shore birds at our March meeting last year.

Gulls

Gulls consistently confound and confuse birders by their complex plumages, protracted maturation process, and their sheer abundance. Furthermore, gulls manifest a number of of interesting biological and evolutionary principles not so readily observed in many bird groups. For these reasons, larids make a model group to study to hone identification techniques and at the same time to acquire knowledge of some basic bird biology.

In this workshop on Massachusett's gulls, topics on gull biology, evolution, ecology, historical status and identification of local species will be covered. Through the use of slides, study skins and discussion, participants will be introduced to the subleties of larid molt and to the many complexities affecting the aging process of gulls.

A full day trip to Newburyport will provide an opportunity for the group to put to use the information gained from the evening session.
