The Exchange, of which our Club is a member is an innovative way for birders like ourselves to relate to our counterparts in Central and South America. Julie hopes to bring Austin Stokes with her to give us a personal account of what is happening. He is just back from the Peace Corps in Honduras where he helped establish the Honduras National Park. donated equipment he helped set up the local Christmas Count. It should be a very interesting and informative personal update on an important project we are involved in.

In addition to the continued need for optics and field guides, used camping equipment such as small tents, sleeping bags, back packs and knapsacks of any size are needed. If you or your office or company has unwanted audio-visual equipment or computers this would be a wonderful place for them to go. The MBO is non-profit -- tax credit is available. FIELD TRIPS

Saturday, February 6: Al Richards will be searching for waterfowl from Falmouth to Plymouth. This is an annual all-day trip that has produced Redheads, Eurasian Wigeons, a variety of sea ducks, loons, grebes and if time allows a try for the Short-eared Owl. Call Al at 665-2761 to sign on.

Saturday, February 13 (Sunday the 14th as rain date): A NEW trip for the Club to Narragansett Bay will be led by Paul Champlin. Paul offers the following as enticement: "Having the largest coast to land area ratio of any state in the Union, it is no wonder that large numbers of water birds winter in Rhode Island every year. The main attraction for these floating masses are the many small harbors and inlets of Narragansett Bay which provide prime feeding and roosting habitat. In the uppermost reaches of the bay, rivers feed into the Narragansett providing great views of dabbling ducks and may provide a good look at Canvasback. From here south, though, it's salt water all the way. Greater Scaup, grebes and both species of goldeneye cruise the shore line in a continuous parade of feathered delight. The rocky oceanside shoreline of Sachuest and Sakonnet Points produce alcids, hawks, both goldeneye and other goodies (Sachuest NWR has been home to wintering flock of up to 60 Harlequin Ducks for many years). If time allows, and I think it will, Northern Shovelers, Pintails, and Redhead will top off our lists at Trustom National Wildlife Refuge."

Landbirds are also expected (there is a Dickcissel wintering in Paul's parent's back yard in Tiverton which is on the itinerary). For more information and to register call Paul at 253-5047, or show up at the Hitchcock Center at 6 am to car-pool. Don't forget the warm clothes, lunch, snacks, etc.

Dear Friends,

On June 14, 7:30 pm at the Hitchcock Center Paul Roberts will present a program entitled "Identifying Hawks in Flight." By way of introduction he tells us "Connecticut Valley birders are uniquely situated to see good numbers of hawks in spring and fall. However, those hawks may often seem very difficult to identify because when seen in flight, they don't look much like anything depicted in your field guides. This slide program will help you to identify hawks in flight, even if you don't see them very well." Paul is the founder of the Eastern Massachusetts Hawk Watch (1976), and currently serves as its Vice President as well as chair of the Northeast Hawk Watch (NEHW). He is a past chair of the Hawk Migration Association of North America (HMANA) and has been teaching courses on hawk identification for fifteen years. He has also served as President of the Brookline Bird Club and as Editor of Bird Observer.

A short business meeting will precede the program. As stated in the Bylaws the membership year runs from September through August. New members may join at any time. However, membership will be for the current membership year unless payment is made after the last meeting of the year. So as not to penalize people who become interested in birding during the spring migration and who wish to become members, the Board voted to recommend the following amendment to be voted upon at the June meeting. MOVED: That Section 4.3 of Article IV of the By-Laws of the Hampshire Bird Club, Inc. be amended as follows: delete the second sentence and replace it with the following sentence: First time members joining and paying dues to the Hampshire Bird Club after April 30 will be granted free membership for the remainder of the club's membership year as defined in Section 4.1 and have their dues credited to the succeeding membership year.

MONTHLY MEETINGS

FIELD TRIPS

The HBC offers two different types of trips: regular and fee-based. Regular field trips will be to spots easily reached and explored in one day. These trips are open to the general public. No costs other than travel, meals and incidental fees are involved. It is our policy to ask that you call the trip leader to register so that s/he can plan for the size of the group and can notify people if a change is necessary. Fee-based trips are generally for a longer period, where costs are predetermined and participants pay in advance. Participants in these trips or on a waiting list for these trips must be HBC members.

It is also our policy to car pool whenever possible and to share in driving expenses. It is recommended that drivers be reimbursed at the rate of at least \$.20 per mile per car plus tolls and parking fees. All persons in the car will be expected to share costs equally.

We are always looking for new places to explore and new leaders to take us there. Bird identification skill is <u>not</u> the most important requirement for being a trip leader. Familiarity with a good birding location is. If you know of a good spot that would lend itself well to a birding group, or would be interested in leading a trip yourself we would like to know about it. The Field Trip Committee meets twice a year for planning -- once in the summer and again in mid-winter. If you have suggestions or would like to be a part of the Committee, please make note on the membership form or contact Field Trip Chair Bob Bieda directly (21 Pomeroy St., Easthampton, MA 01027; 413-527-2623).

"THE GREAT DAY COMETH" echoes across winter-locked fields.

АННННН

At 3:00 am she stands motionless by a railroad crossing listening for the owl's call. Could it be a Long-eared? No, it's the wind gusting to 50 mph. At dawn they trudge numbly through open fields with expectant ears listening for a sparrow's "chip." Possibly a Clay-colored? No, another Savannah. At sunset he plods wearily and hungrily, eyes glazed with excitement. The climactic moment of the day has arrived as our searcher zeros in on and begins the count of starlings flying to roost in the trees along the Connecticut: 5,432, -33, -34, -35, -36, . . .

WOW

Yup -- it's that time again. The Annual CHRISTMAS COUNT down is upon us and will be plotted and planned at our next monthly meeting Monday, December 13, 7:30 pm. record, the count is a census of birdlife taken annually at the end of the year across the Continent. It was started in 1899 as an alternative to the traditional Christmas "side hunt," a time when hunters would go out after Christmas dinner, chose sides and compete to see which group could shoot the most birds. The count is sponsored by the National Audubon Society and is undertaken by volunteers who count not only the different species of birds but also the actual number of individuals. This major information gathering event has thousands of birdwatchers participating. Data fed into the computer gives densities of wintering bird populations and points out cyclical movements and evidence of change in populations. When studied over the years, it is helpful in detecting trends and pinpointing problems.

You don't have to be an expert and you don't have to count all day. In fact, you can participate by simply counting birds at your feeders in the warmth of your home. If you are a beginner, you can be put with a more experienced birder. Our local count on Sunday, December 19 covers an area on both sides of the river. There will be a potluck supper at Arcadia at 6:15 p.m. when the day's count of the whole area will be compiled. A fee of \$5.00 per person goes to American Birds to help cover costs of compiling and publishing the results.

If you are interested in participating but can't attend the meeting, please call Jan Ortiz (549-1768) for information and assignment. There will be similar counts for Springfield on <u>December 18</u> (call Mort Bates at 783-6411), for Greenfield on <u>December 26</u> (call Mark Fairbrother at 367-2695) and for Quabbin on <u>January 1</u> (call Scott Surner at 253-7486).

The meeting on <u>Monday</u>, <u>December 13</u>, at the Hitchcock Center at 7:30 p.m. is the annual holiday party when members

have the opportunity to tell their Big Bird Stories and show their own natural history slides -- any natural history subject is welcome but not more than ten slides, please. It is also a time when we get an early start on holiday eating. We are all asked to bring a snack or dessert to share. The Christmas Count planning will follow the meeting.

Mark your 1994 calendars now so as not to miss Tom Ricardi on Monday, January 10; Mark Lynch and Sheila Carrol on Monday, February 14; and Bill Burt on Monday, March 14.

Several field trips are planned to give you a jump start on your year list, or to help you fulfill your New Year's Resolution to bird more.

On <u>Sunday</u>, <u>January 2</u> be ready for the famous BIRD BLITZ for TWELVE CHRONIC LISTERS with Scott Surner (253-7486). It's a great way to start the year and coming just after the Christmas Counts, Scott should know where to find the birds.

On <u>Saturday</u>, <u>January 8</u> Bob Bieda (527-2623) will lead a trip to the North Shore.

On <u>Saturday</u>, <u>January 22</u> Jeff Johnstone (508-249-9052) will conduct an evening Saw-whet Owl search (8:00 pm to Midnight).
