COSTA RICA TRIP

As announced in the last letter, the Club is sponsoring a thirteen-day trip to Costa Rica in 1995 through Victor Emanuel Nature Tours (VENT). The response to this new way of providing trip opportunities was gratifying. Eight people have already paid their deposits. This leaves six more spaces to fill. Here are a few of the particulars you will want if considering being one of the participants.

Costa Rica is often called the "Switzerland of Central America." It is a small, stable country with a prosperous middle class, fine educational system, and spectacular highland terrain. For its size it is one of the richest countries in the world for birds, with over 750 species known within an area the size of West Virginia. addition, Costa Rica boasts the finest national park system in Latin America, protecting examples of all major habitats and the flora and fauna within. As we explore each of the major habitats, we will search for many of Central America's most spectacular birds. The list seems endless -- the magnificent Resplendent Quetzal, Jabiru, Black-chested Hawk, Black Guan, Double-striped Thick-knee, Scarlet Macaw, over thirty species of hummingbirds, ten trogons, motmots, barbets, manakins, and on and on and on. (Secretarial note -- I don't even know which birds to pick to list for you. What I do know is that I have convinced myself and will be one of the 14 to experience the adventure.)

BIRDING with HITCHCOCK

Dear Friends,

We do have a terrific program planned for April if the snow drifts don't make us cancel. With more than a little luck the snow might even be gone by <u>April 11</u> and we will see you at the Hitchcock Center enjoying the monthly program featuring Alvah Sanborn, former Director of the Pleasant Valley Sanctuary, Massachusetts Audubon Society, in Lenox, Massachusetts. Alvah has also been a lecturer for the National Audubon Society and is a member of the Camera Naturalists of New England. Now retired, he spends his winters on Sanibel Island, Florida. The title of his program is "Sanibel -- Natural History of a Barrier Island."

A short business meeting will precede the program. Because interest in birding and in Club activities has increased greatly in recent years and our membership is at an all-time high, the Board of Directors would like to enlarge the size of the Board in order to give more people a chance at leadership roles. This requires a change in the The Board proposes that we increase the size of the Board from nine to eleven by adding one Member at Large and by splitting the Secretary's position into two parts, Membership Secretary and Communications Secretary, both of which will be officers in the organization. The Membership Secretary "will be responsible for processing and maintaining the membership and mailing lists of the HBC." The Communications Secretary will be responsible for all other jobs as defined in section 6.5 under Article VI. proper language needed to effect the changes in Articles V, VI and IX will be presented for your consideration and vote at the April 11 meeting.

Also in keeping with the By-Laws, we will be electing a new Board (numbering eleven if the By-Law changes are approved) at our May meeting. The Nominating Committee -- Jim Marcum (chair), Paul Champlin, and Marilyn Gonter will present a slate at that time. Call one of them if you wish to offer a name for consideration. Nominations will also be taken from the floor.

And while we are on the subject of HBC organization, one area really needs our attention. There are several interesting conservation projects that we as an active Club could be involved in. Project Tanager, out of Cornell Lab

of Ornithology, needs help from local groups in assessing the breeding status of tanager species. Last year's pilot project was very successful but much more information is needed. International Migratory Bird Day (IMBD) on May 14 is another exciting project now in its second year. Coordinated by Smithsonian, Cornell and the National Audubon Society, it also involves many bird clubs and conservation organizations working to gather data and to educate people about Neotropical Migrants.

In the past a number of HBC members have shown interest in being part of a Conservation Committee but unfortunately the interest has never been developed. What we need now is someone who would be willing to bring these people together to explore and discuss conservation possibilities, local and beyond, that Club members might participate in. If you would like to take on this Committee project or be a part of it please call Jan Ortiz (549-1768).

Was it only a year ago I was ironing bed sheets and bath towels while watching Huey, Louie and Dewey outwit Uncle Donald on the Saturday Morning Cartoon Festival in order to avoid the production of the Hampshire Bird Club Newsletter, August Edition? Those who have followed my emotional and intellectual development over the HBC Newsletter years will be happy to learn that shortly after that letter, realizing that I was out of control, I joined a recovery program for Saturday Morning Cartoon addicts and now I only watch The Discovery Network and The MacNeil/Lehrer NewsHour. My one relapse occurred during a George of the Jungle Cartoon Festival just before the December holidays -- always a stressful time of the year.

But I digress.

The real purpose of writing the Hampshire Bird Club Newsletter, August Edition, is to give you general information about the Club, let you know about programs, field trips, and interesting birding events, and to suggest, request, and, yes, even demand payment. The end of August is in sight and I can no longer put this off. So with a little help from my friends -- chocolate, diet soda and word processor -- I offer the following:

The Club is a good source of information for birdwatching newcomers as well as for the more experienced birder. All are welcome. As a member you receive monthly mailings describing regular programs, field trips, and bird related events in the area. You have access to our ever expanding lending library for birders located at the Hitchcock Center; earn the privilege of getting frostbite by participating in local Christmas Bird Counts (not mandatory); and can have a place on the Rare Bird Alert telephone tree (if desired). Through the VOICE (an up-to-date recorded telephone service) you will learn what and where birds are being seen, reminders of meetings and trips, and news that may not have been covered in the letter. All this, and as a new member, you receive the treasured and truly amazing MEMBERSHIP PACKET filled with membership-only kinds of information. (And you thought this was just another Bird Club!)

Our membership year runs from September through August. You may join at any time, but this is the only letter that goes out to everyone on the mailing list.

In order to maintain the quality of our programs and continuing service to the membership, and because postage is going up, we have found it necessary to raise membership cost by whopping \$1.00 for an individual or by a menacing \$2.00 for a family unit. This is still one of the best bargains around. Should you be interested in becoming more involved in the Club, you will find a spot on the Membership Form where you can check off your interests. Your name will be passed on to the appropriate person. On the back of the Membership Form there is a form from the Field Trip Committee asking for information which will help in planning future long-distance trips. Also enclosed with this letter is the Release Form that needs to be signed and the Rare Bird Alert for those interested.

Monthly meetings are held at the Hitchcock Center in Amherst on the second Monday of the month (holiday exception October 17, not 10), September through June, at 7:30 pm. People come early (and stay late) to socialize, immerse themselves in the "The Taste of HBC" (goodies provided by the Club and by members), peruse the HBC Library and shop in the Hitchcock Gift Shop. All programs are free and open to the public. I've been asked to remind you that if you need to park along the driveway do so on the north side only. Carpooling is a good idea when possible.

On Monday, September 12, Arthur Morris, internationally noted nature photographer, returns to present a slide lecture entitled "Everything You Wanted To Know About Shorebirds But Were Afraid To Ask." Waders (herons, egrets, bitterns) will also be featured in a presentation that he is fashioning especially for our Club. More than 1,400 of Art's images and 42 of his photo-illustrated articles have been published in virtually all major birding and natural history magazines. Nine of his images have appeared on Audubon and Kodak calendars and he is the author of the color photo booklet, Bird Photography Basics. Since his program last September, I have been amazed at how often I have seen his name next to a photo --he's everywhere. He will bring copies of his booklet, mounted prints and notecards which can be purchased should you be interested. Come join us for the first meeting of the year. It's a nice way to start the fall routine!

HAMPSHIRE BIRD CLUB RARE BIRD ALERT 1994-1995

A telephone tree is used to alert interested members to rare birds in the area. Northern Wheatear, Pine Grosbeaks, and Bohemian Waxwings by the carload; Warblers -- Kentucky, Cerulean and Worm-eating; Snowy Plover, Common Moorhen and White-eyed Vireo were just a few of the birds people saw or tried to see last year because of the tree.

As was true last year, the VOICE will be used to report local sightings of interesting birds. This should meet the needs of many of us. For those of us who are more interested in going after rare or unusual birds, the Rare Bird Alert telephone tree will be activated. There will be two categories:

- A. For rare birds in the Pioneer Valley only.
- B. For rare birds in the Pioneer Valley and beyond.

Signing up for either category implies that you want to <u>be</u> called and are willing to <u>call</u> at any time. The secret to making the tree work is individual commitment to passing along the word.

It is absolutely essential that you call the next person on the list immediately. If unable to reach that individual personally, you keep going down the list until you do reach someone. It is still your responsibility to see that those not contacted are reached later on. Please do not sign up if you are only casually interested. We have learned that the tree falls apart when even one person does not cooperate.

People responding by October 1 will be included on the first tree. An additional tree will be formed in December if enough people are interested.

Costa Rica:

The Club is sponsoring a thirteen-day trip to Costa Rica in July of 1995 through Victor Emanuel Nature Tours (VENT). The response to this new way of providing trip opportunities has been gratifying. Ten people have already paid their deposits. This leaves four more spaces to fill.

The natural riches of Costa Rica are legendary and it has become one of the world's premier natural history destinations. It is a small, stable country with a prosperous middle class, fine educational system, and spectacular highland terrain. For its size it is one of the richest countries in the world for birds, with over 750 species known within an area the size of West Virginia. In addition, Costa Rica boasts the finest national park system in Latin America, protecting examples of all major habitats and the flora and fauna within. Many can not get away during March and April when most people visit Costa Rica so we have chosen July for our trip. Surprisingly, summer is actually 5 to 10 degrees cooler than in the winter. Although it is the rainy season, on most afternoons only one hard but brief rainfall is encountered, and these showers are followed by dawn-like bird activity. As we explore each of the major habitats, we will search for many of Central America's most spectacular birds. The list seems endless -- the magnificent Resplendent Quetzal, Three-wattled Bellbird, Black-chested Hawk, Great Tinamou, Scarlet Macaw, over thirty species of hummingbirds, ten trogons, motmots, barbets, manakins, and on and on and on. (Secretarial note -- I don't know which birds to pick to list for What I do know is that I will be one of the 14 sharing the adventure with friends who have also birded Wildwood Cemetary, Plum Island, and Barton's Cove.) From all reports it's a priceless (if pricey) once-in-a-lifetime experience.

"THE GREAT DAY COMETH" echoes across winter-locked fields.

AHHHHH!

3:00 a.m.: A frigid vigil by a railroad crossing --- listening --- Is that a Long-eared Owl calling or the wind gusting to 50 mph?

Dawn: An icy trudge through open fields, expectant ears listening --- listening --- there it is, the sparrow's "chip"! Could it possibly be a Clay-colored? No, it's a cold Savannah.

Sunset: Even though weary, cold and hungry, the eyes of our birder are on fire with excitement. No identification questions this time. The climactic moment of the day has arrived as our hero zeros in on and begins the count of the Starlings along the Connecticut: 5432 ... 5433 ... 5434 ...

WOW!

Yup -- it's that time again. The Annual CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT is upon us and will be plotted and planned at our next meeting on Monday, December 12, 7:30 pm, at the Hitchcock Center. For the record, the count is a census of birdlife taken annually at the end of the year across the Continent. It was started in 1899 as an alternative to the traditional Christmas "side hunt," a time when hunters would go out after Christmas dinner, chose sides and compete to see which group could shoot the most birds. The count is sponsored by the National Audubon Society and is undertaken by volunteers who count not only the different species of birds but also the actual number of individuals. Thousands of birdwatchers participate in this major information gathering event. fed into the computer show densities of wintering bird populations and help to point out cyclical movements and evidence of changes in populations. Studied over the years, the information is helpful in detecting trends and pinpointing problems.

You don't have to be an expert and you don't have to count all day. In fact, you can participate by simply counting birds at your feeders in the warmth of your home. If you are a beginner, you can be put with an experienced birder.

Our local count (officially the Northampton Christmas Count) on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>December 18</u> covers an area on both sides of the river. Immediately following the Count participants will meet at Arcadia for the compilation. (Note that there will <u>not</u> be a potluck this year.) A \$5.00 fee to cover costs of compiling and publishing the results is required from all field observers. The fee does not apply to feeder watchers unless they wish to be listed with participants in the published CBC issue of the National Audubon Society

publication Field Notes. If you are interested in participating in this local count but can't attend the meeting, please call Jan Ortiz (549-1768) for information and assignment.

There will be similar counts for Springfield on December 17 (call Mort Bates at 783-6411), for Athol on December 17 (call David Small at 508-249-2094), for Quabbin on December 31 (call Scott Surner at 253-7486) and for Greenfield on January 2 (call Mark Fairbrother at 367-2695).

MEETINGS

The meeting on <u>Monday</u>, <u>December 12</u>, at the Hitchcock Center at 7:30 p.m. is the annual holiday party when members have the opportunity to tell their Big Bird Stories and show their own natural history slides -- any natural history subject is welcome but <u>not more than ten slides</u>, <u>please</u>. In order that the hands behind the word processor can be better employed as the hands behind the binoculars, this letter will be short! (Oh sure -- "Promises, promises", mumbles the reader.) This is also a two-months-in-one mailing to allow the same hands behind the same word processor a break. (Besides, I'll be gone most of May.)

PROGRAMS

The HBC fledged fully in the fall of 1984. One of its first members and one of its first presenters migrated over the Holyoke Range from South Hadley to give an absolutely delightful program on her "addiction," the Black-capped Chickadee. The title of her program, "Flock Switching in Black-capped Chickadees" got lots of attention and was the first of roughly biannual visits updating her research. On Monday, June 13 Tom French will be with us to present a program entitled "Natural Heritage and Endangered Species." Tom has been with the Massachusetts Division of Fisheries and Wildlife for ten years working in conservation education. OF GENERAL INTEREST

The Board is very happy to announce that the response to the request for Conservation Committee volunteers in the last Newsletter was gratifying. Anne Lombard has agreed to coordinate interested people and Micky McKinley has gathered information around Project Tanager which will be the first project. Anne gives us the following:

PROJECT TANAGER

The Hampshire Bird Club will be participating in Project Tanager this spring and summer. Project Tanager is a national science project in progress at the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology designed to involve birders across the country in determining the relationship of forest fragmentation to the success of breeding. Specifically, project participants gather data to test whether four species of North American tanagers are able to nest successfully in forest patches of different sizes. The hope is that volunteer birders will be able to collect data on a massive scale not possible by any team of professional researchers.

We are in the process of selecting 12 sites in the Valley ranging in size from 30 to 300 acres. Depending on the number of people interested, we will divide into three teams, each team responsible for four sites. The first visit to each site will take place during the third or fourth week of May, according to the specific guidelines set up by Cornell, and will determine whether scarlet tanagers are at the site. If so, follow-up visits will take place in June and July to attempt to determine whether successful breeding has taken place. Our data will be sent to Cornell and analyzed with that from other areas of the country.

If this project is a success, and interest continues, we plan to become involved in other conservation projects in the future.
